


Detention Facilities provide for the temporary care of young people who, pending court disposition or other hearings, require secure custody either for the protection of the community, themselves, or to ensure their appearance in court.

Committed Facilities serve young people court ordered to receive treatment interventions in an out-ofhome setting.

Maryland's Juvenile Justice Reform Legislation



Effective Date June 1. 2022

Changes

- Increases access to diversion
- Sets a minimum age of juvenile court jurisdiction
- Prohibits detention for misdemeanor offenders and technical violations of probation
- Sets length of probation guidelines (no data available at this time)
- Prohibits out-of-home commitment for misdemeanor offenders and technical violations of probation




Implementation Actions

DJS lead over 50 trainings for DJS staff, law enforcement, judges, legal providers, community based organizations, and local /state agencies.

Expanding Access to Diversion


The legislation expanded DJS authority to place non-violent felony matters on pre-court supervision. During the first 6 months of implementation the rate of pre-court supervision has increased.



Detention Utilization

The legislation prohibits detaining youth charged with a misdemeanor offense, EXCEPT if the youth is charged with misdemeanor HGV or has 2 prior adjudications in the previous 12 months.

 misdemeanor handgun violations account for 44 placements in FY 2022 and 33 placements from July, 2022- Dec 31, 2022




Minimum Age of Jurisdiction

Since June 1, 2022 the rate of youth under 13 charged with a crime of violence has declined compared to FY 2022.



Commitment Utilization

The legislation prohibits the use of commitment for misdemeanor offenses (except HGV) and technical violations of probation. * misdemeanor handgun violations account for 25 commitments in FY 2022 and 15 on 12/23/22.





Complaints By Offense







Committed ADP • Probation Average Case Load



12-Month Reconviction Rate


